AGENCY AND EMPOWERMENT

The theme of this year's conference is agency and empowerment. This is the key to Dorothy's work. She declared: 'If you can't take the power-shift, get out of the kitchen.' Teacher management, she wrote, 'shifts from this is what you will do to we're going to deal with this Some teachers find that shift impossible because it is a big power shift.' This is a shift, then, from 'teacher talk' to 'colleague talk':

'What we're dealing with here - it's not just an alternative, it's a complete, radical, different power-shift ... All information will be given through the "colleague" code, and that is really radical... And it's never: "You'll do it for me"; because I can't use that kind of power... What you think a learning process is, is ultimately what you'll answer - and what will choose you.'

This conference will address the question: How can we make this shift happen, in our own praxis?

HOW IT WILL WORK

ON 7 NOVEMBER, there will be an ONLINE DAY, with an international line-up of speakers and panellists.

ON 8 NOVEMBER, there will be a CREATIVE PRACTICES Day. Delegates will work for a day with a leading practitioner, and will also take part in a drama session in a local school.

ON 9-10 NOVEMBER, there will be a two-day conference weekend, with practical drama workshops and panel discussions.

THE PROGRAMME IN DETAIL

THURSDAY 7 NOVEMBER: ONLINE DAY

10am-11.15am: FINDINGS OF THE PAUL HAMLYN FOUNDATION PROJECT ON MANTLE OF THE EXPERT - IONA TOWLER EVANS AND TIM TAYLOR

Iona and Tim will share findings from a 4-year research (2019-2023) project supported by the Paul Hamlyn Trust. Iona and her colleague Eirwen Hopkins analysed the impact of Mantle of the Expert, on the shifts in teachers' practice and the quality of children's learning at Welsh primary schools and bordering English schools, taught by Tim (Taylor) and Luke Abbott, and coordinated by Helen Chapman, Headteacher of Morda Primary school, Shropshire. The analysis was based on the narratives of the teachers and observation of the training and classroom processes, as well as on questionnaire outcomes which tracked their developing understanding and application of Mantle of the Expert. Both Tim and Iona will share the key elements that impact change in teachers approaches, as well as the shift in learning from the children's experience and perspectives, in applying Heathcote's approach to teaching and learning though drama.

Iona Towler Evans is a National Trainer in Mantle of the Expert and a Governor at Woodrow First School. Tim Taylor is the author of *A Beginner's Guide to Mantle of the Expert*

11.30am-12.30pm: COUNTER IMAGINARIES - TOWARD A NEW CARTOGRAPHY OF AGENCY SUKHESH ARORA AND ISHA VERMA

Schools, and teaching-learning in school, are generally seen as being deficient and in need of transformation. Teachers are increasingly seen as the agents of change to bring about this transformation. But the concepts of agency and agentic practices remain vague and poorly articulated. Through Counter Imaginaries, we attempted to unpack the layers of meaning surrounding the concepts of agency and agentic practices, so as to imagine new possibilities of how teachers might enact practice. The research, carried out over a period of 18 months, is based on oral narratives of a small cohort of teachers, all of whom are graduates of a teacher education program offered by Delhi University. Theatre is an integral part of the program, and the research used the lens of theatre to examine these concepts. The presentation is based on emerging findings from this research.

The project was supported by a grant from the TESF Network which addresses larger questions of how education systems can act as drivers sustainable development.

Isha Verma is a Researcher in the Department of Education Policy and Leadership at the Education University of Hong Kong. Sukhesh Arora is an actor and performance-maker. A Charles Wallace Fellow, and IVLP alumna, he was a guest professor with the Elementary Education Department, Delhi University. In 2022, he received a grant from the TESF Network to research the relationship between teacher agency and the performing arts.

<u>12.30pm-1.30pm: THE "GRIT" PROJECT - MAGGIE HULSON, RAJA' FARAH AND MUTASEM</u> <u>ATRASH</u>

The act of collaboration between practitioners in the shared world of Drama brings us closer - united not just by content and form, but also by stance. Sharing work and collaborating across borders enriches us all. in this online session we will explore the importance of contact between practitioners in and between countries, and how it might be managed. In particular we will discuss the Palestinian context where there is a clear need for support from teachers around the world. We can refer to previous and current work and how drama through Mantle of the Expert can give young people the opportunity to express themselves and think about the situation around them.

She is an actor, drama-in-education expert and entrepreneur. Vishakha Chakravarty is a director at *Joy of Drama*. David Allen is Artistic Director of Midland Actors Theatre.

<u>9am – 10am: KEYNOTE WITH BRIAN EDMISTON - HUMANIZING TEACHING WITH DRAMATIC INQUIRY</u> George Wood Theatre

Dorothy Heathcote champions drama because of how we can teach to explore with students "the complexity of living" in relation to "all the affairs of [hu]mankind." With reference to classroom examples, I will explore the significance of using dramatic inquiry to humanize four core dimensions of teaching: leading, directing, mentoring, and managing.

10.15pm – 12.15pm: PRACTICAL WORKSHOPS

WORKSHOP 1: CECILY O'NEILL - QUESTIONS, QUESTIONS... George Wood Theatre

An actor asks - When shall we three meet again? And the audience is provoked into answering with questions — Who is this? What's going to happen? This practical workshop will explore ways of using questions to generate, develop and reflect on the drama.

WORKSHOP 2: STIG A. ERIKSSON - THE FIDDLER GIRL Studio 3

The workshop will investigate themes and motifs of empowerment and agency inscribed in Jon Fosse's illustrated children's book, "The Fiddler Girl," through the genre of process drama. We will use pictures and text excerpts from the book to look at obstacles, dilemmas, and solutions that the main character, the fiddler girl, is faced with in her quest of getting through to her father – somewhat like a character from a traditional Norwegian fairy tale. We will:

- Look at imaginative literature as a source of creating drama.
- Apply process drama to open up discussion on challenges and empowerment in children's lives.
- Explore contemporary literature for understanding cultural traditions and life dilemmas.

WORKSHOP 3: DAVID ALLEN AND ROBERTA LUCHINI - DRAMA AND "LIVING HISTORY" Studio 4

Dorothy Heathcote led a number of projects which focused on history topics, including a number of projects with heritage sites. The Mantle Network has been awarded a grant by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, to create new heritage projects inspired by her work. In this session, we will review some of the strategies she used, to bring history to life.

1.15pm – 2.15pm: DRAMA-IN-ENGLISH: EMPOWERING LEARNERS TO GENERATE THEIR OWN READINGS OF TEXTS WITH THEO BRYER, JANE COLES & MAGGIE PITFIELD George Wood Theatre

We offer a new way of conceptualising drama's relationship with secondary English through a synthesis of the work of Myra Barrs, Louise Rosenblatt and Dorothy Heathcote. The embedded form of role and enactment we call 'drama-in-English' offers space for learners to assume a range of voices and perspectives within a specific imaginative context, promoting creative, playful and critical responses that may be expressed orally, in writing or through the body. We will share examples of embedded practice which take Heathcote's role conventions as a starting-point for work in English classrooms.

2.15 – 3.15PM: "SISTER DORA": THEATRE-IN-EDUCATION PRESENTATION WITH DAVID ALLEN, ROBERTA LUCHINI AND STUDENTS FROM BIRMINGHAM NEWMAN UNIVERSITY
